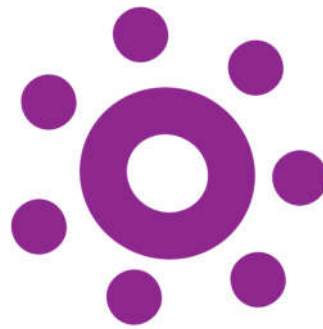

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## 2022-2023 Rotary International Theme



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### 2022-2023 RI President Jennifer Jones

Rotary International President Jennifer Jones wanted members to imagine the possibilities in the change they can make to transform the world. When Jones, a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada, revealed the 2022-23 presidential theme, *Imagine Rotary*, she urged people to dream big and harness their connections and the power of Rotary to turn those dreams into reality. She said, Imagine, a world that deserves our best,” “where we get up each day knowing that we can make a difference.” Jones made history on 1 July 2022 by becoming Rotary’s first female president.



### 2022-2023 Zone 32 Director Drew Kessler

Kessler joined Rotary in 2001, at the age of 20. He went on to serve as President of the Rotary Club of North Rockland at age 25 – at that time the youngest president in the club’s then 80-year history. At age 32, he served as District Governor for Rotary District 7210. “For anyone who says that you have to be retired to serve in these positions, I’d like to show that there is another path,” says Kessler.

He has served Rotary International on the Young Past District Governor’s Committee as well as representative to the Council on Legislation and RI president’s representative. Kessler also served in numerous Zone leadership positions, including general chair of the Zone 28/32 Summit & Symposium, assistant Rotary coordinator for Zone 32 and general chair for the Mid-North East president’s elect training seminar. Committed to continuity and collaboration, he is a member of the District 7210 Executive Board, a committee he helped establish that is made up of both past and present district leaders that collaborate to the lead the District.

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## 2022-23 District Global Grants

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**District Global Grant Committee Co-Chairs:  
Kathleen Stoup (Carlisle) and Dr. Bob McClenathan (Lancaster)**

Doing the most good in the world is the goal of Global Grants, a program of The Rotary Foundation that provides financial support to make projects possible in poor places in the world. Through the magic of “matching” a small amount of money donated by a club (or group of clubs) can increase to make available larger sums that make significant improvements in the lives of those living in the communities served by Global Grant projects. Currently the district gives a 100% match to contributions from clubs and The Rotary Foundation gives an 80% match to district support.

Seven Global Grant projects were being implemented in 2022-2023. The largest project budget is \$141,000; the smallest is \$43,600. District Designated Funds in the amount of \$156,350 over several years supported these efforts. A special thank you to those 7390 Rotarians who contribute annually to The Rotary Foundation. Support from the Foundation makes these projects possible.

Rotarians in District 7390 can be proud of the good works made possible by Global Grants. Following are descriptions of some of the projects implemented during fiscal year 2022-2023.



**Metalillito Water System Enhancement** in El Salvador sponsored by Rotary Club of Mechanicsburg (now RC of Yellow Breeches) provided a solar powered potable water system for a population of 1075 and installation of 30 composting toilets. Budget for the project is \$47,218, with \$13,100 from club, \$13,100 from district, \$20,150 from The Rotary Foundation and \$868 from other sources. Tom Burson is the primary contact for the project.

**Water Sanitation** project in Togo sponsored by the Rotary Club of Carlisle-Sunrise provided a well, hand-washing station, and latrine (with 3 block stalls for women men, disabled) in two poor villages serving 2500 residents. Funds were also given to rehabilitate existing latrines. Budget for the project is \$43,600, with \$15,500 from club, \$15,100 from district and \$12,400 from The Rotary Foundation. Larenda Twigg was primary contact. A follow-up global grant project is planned to bring a similar benefit to 3 additional poor villages.

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## 2022-23 District Global Grants

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**Food Production for St. Marten Street Children** in Philippines sponsored by RC of Hanover is giving street boys knowledge to produce their own food and gain lifetime agricultural skills. The emphasis is on rice production and some vegetables, fruit, fish and pigs. The budget is \$64,500, with \$18,000 from the club, \$18,000 from district and \$27,500 from The Rotary Foundation. The primary contact is Jess Socrates.



**Water for personal consumption and Agricultural Development** in Kenya sponsored by Rotary Club of Carlisle is supporting a program that serves a Children's Safe Home and surrounding community providing food and water for the children as well as life skills in agriculture. The greenhouse was built and fields developed using drip irrigation for growing vegetables, poultry and pig production made possible, solar power installed to enable project to maintain temperature controls in structures and drip irrigation. Training is given in the science and business of agriculture. A dependable food and water source is provided for group homes and community. Total budget is \$132,958 with \$35,730 from club, \$35,730 from district, \$56,725 from The Rotary Foundation with \$3380 from other sources. Kathleen Stoup is primary contact.

**Medical Equipment for Multidisciplinary Intervention for Euro development** in Argentina is sponsored by RC of York North with funding from Rotary clubs of York, York East, Lancaster, Red Lion/Dallastown. The project purchased medical equipment and provided training on use of equipment. Budget is \$132,958 with \$17,270 from 7390 clubs, \$17,270 from district, \$17,270 from The Rotary Foundation (with \$81,148 from other sources). Norm Basso is primary contact for the project.

**Eye Care** in Kenya is a project to check students in poor areas for vision problems. The Rotary Club of Carlisle and district 7390 contributed funds to this project that was sponsored by district 5020 in Canada. Volunteers and eye care professionals visit schools, test students and recommend treatments when needed. Funds are given for testing supplies, eyeglasses, and other benefits. The budget is \$35,250 with \$1750 from Carlisle club, \$1750 from district 7390, \$6750 from The Rotary Foundation with \$25,000 from Kenyan and Canadian sources. Kathleen Stoup is primary contact.

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## Operation Braveheart III

Sponsored by Passport Club with additional funds from Lancaster and Mont Joy, this program is making possible transcatheter cardiac repair of indigent patients in the Philippines. Most patients are children. Dr. Jonas Rosario and the local hospital donate surgeries. The Rotary global grant project pays cost of the device needed for the repair. Operation Braveheart III is a continuation of previous projects that provided this surgery. To date, 186 patients have received this life sustaining surgery. The total budget is \$141,000 with \$50,000 from clubs, \$50,000 from district and \$41,000 from The Rotary Foundation. Dr. Jess Socrates is the primary contact.

## 23-24 Global Grant Authorization

In addition to the above-described global grant projects, district 7390 authorized funding for two Vocational Training Teams that will travel to Zambia in November 2023. One team, that will provide vision care, is sponsored by Rotary Club of Lancaster, and will be led by the primary contact, Robert McClenathan, OD. The other team, which will address global health issues, is sponsored by Rotary Club of York East with PDG Connie Spark as primary contact. As the projects will be implemented in 2023-2024, the accomplishments of these efforts will be reported at the end of that fiscal year.

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## 2022-23 Global Grant Scholarships

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**Chair: Ed Hauck (Lancaster)**

The Rotary Foundation Global Grant Scholarships (GG Scholarships) program is the successor to the Ambassadorial Scholarships program, one of the longest continually running grant programs of the Foundation. GG Scholarships are funded by contributions to the Rotary Foundation not only by our District Rotarians, but also by Rotarians around the world. The amount of our District Rotary giving limits the number of scholarships funded annually with matching contributions from the Foundation's World Fund.

District 7390 accepts applications from students pursuing their first year of graduate studies abroad. Applicants must reside in or have attended an institution of higher learning within the seven counties of District 7390. The applicant's study program must directly address one of the Foundation's seven areas of focus with credible plans to pursue a career related to that area of focus. Areas of focus include:

- Peacebuilding and Conflict Prevention
- Disease Prevention and Treatment
- Water Sanitation and Hygiene
- Maternal and Child Health
- Basic Education and Literacy
- Community Economic Development
- Environment

Applicants submit their applications in January of the current Rotary year through a District Rotary club. The District GG Scholarship committee assembles and evaluates applications, then interviews qualified applicants in February, selecting candidate(s) to recommend to the Rotary Foundation. The Committee works with Rotary Foundation staff and the chosen candidate(s) to finalize approval and arrangements for the scholar's study program starting in the fall of the following Rotary year. The District committee collaborates with a host Rotary club committee in the applicant's study city, ensuring that the scholar receives all necessary support. The scholar reports to his or her sponsoring District 7390 Rotary club, the District 7390 committee, the host Rotary club, and the Foundation periodically throughout the year abroad.



The winner of this year's scholarship was Norma Jean Park. Norma Jean hails from Denver, PA and studied International Studies at Dickinson College. She was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Carlisle. Norma Jean used her Global Grant scholarship to obtain a Master of Arts degree in Food and Development from the University of Sussex in Brighton, England. The Rotary Area of focus for her scholarship was community and economic development. Her focus is to alleviate poverty, promote social equity, and protect the environment in the Global South. After earning her degree, she will support positive development outcomes through volunteer work with the Brighton and Hove Food Partnership as well as sustainable food security initiatives with the United Nations upon graduation.

Norma Jean first explored community development as an International Studies major and Economics minor at Dickinson College. To supplement her coursework, she studied abroad in Argentina where she volunteered at a safe shelter leading life skills workshops to increase employment opportunities among women escaping domestic violence. Upon graduation from Dickinson College she interned with OutRight Action International where she addressed disparities that prevent LGBTQ+ populations from obtaining social and economic inclusion. Beginning in 2019, she spent 15-months volunteering with Peace Corps Ecuador. It was in Ecuador that she co-founded a grassroots initiative that teaches environmental conservation through subsidized rafting excursions for locals, allowing them to better capitalize on ecotourism. Norma Jean also developed curriculum for a sustainable agriculture course that aimed to increase land productivity and income for small-scale farmers. After leaving Ecuador she apprenticed on organic farms where she made healthy produce accessible to low-income communities by fostering relationships with the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program and local food banks. Prior to leaving for England, Norma Jean worked at a non-profit health clinic where she utilized grant funding to increase access to reproductive and gender-affirming health services for marginalized populations. Through these experiences she decided that to improve economic outcomes among underserved groups, she would pursue a career that empowers community-led sustainable food systems.

# 2022-23 Rotary Peace Fellowships

Every year, Rotary selects some of the world's brightest and most dedicated professionals to study at seven Rotary Peace Centers around the world. More than 1400 program alumni work in over 115 countries and serve as leaders in governments and nongovernmental organizations, education, research, law enforcement and the military as well as in international organizations dedicated to peace.

Up to 130 graduate students per year receive fully funded fellowships to pursue studies in peace and development. The fellowships pay for tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation and all internship and field study expenses for either a master's degree or a professional certificate. The centers, hosted by premier universities around the world, provide customized studies and offer field-based learning opportunities.

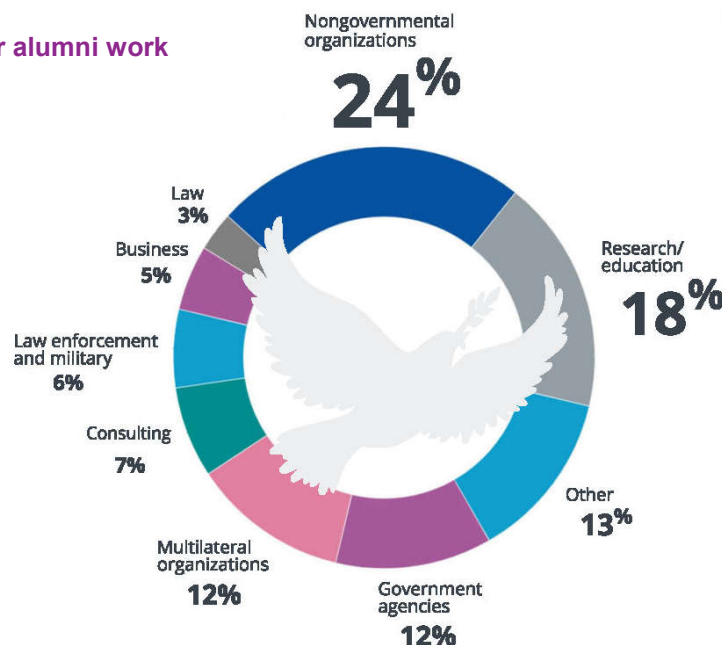
At the 2023 District Conference an informative program was given by two alumni of the Peace Fellowship Program. One speaker was from Israel and the other from Palestine. They described the Fellowship program and the friendship they developed as they participated in their studies.

District 7390 participated in the competitive selection process by interviewing two candidates referred to us by the Rotary Peace Program. An in-person interview was held with the candidate from the United States and a zoom interview took place with the prospect from Ethiopia. In both cases, the district strongly supported the candidacy of these individuals. Final selection will be made by the Rotary Peace program. In late fall candidates will be notified about whether they were selected.

# 2022-23 Rotary Foundation Events



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District Polio Chair: **Dave Getz (Mechanicsburg-North)**

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the **Global Polio Eradication Initiative**, our District along with others around the world, has reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year. During the 23-24 Rotary Year

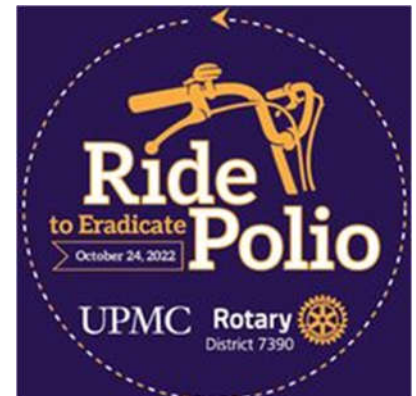

# 2022-23 Four-Way Test ESSAY & SPEECH Contest

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District Youth Exchange Chair: Jill Tenny (Harrisburg)

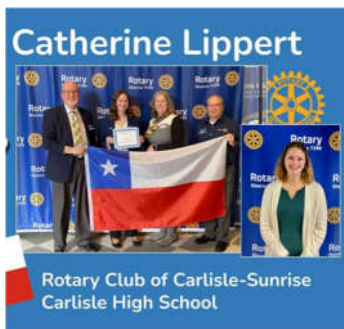
The 2022-2023 Rotary Youth Exchange year was an exciting one after a 2-year Youth Exchange hiatus due to the COVID-19 global pandemic.

# District Safety Committee



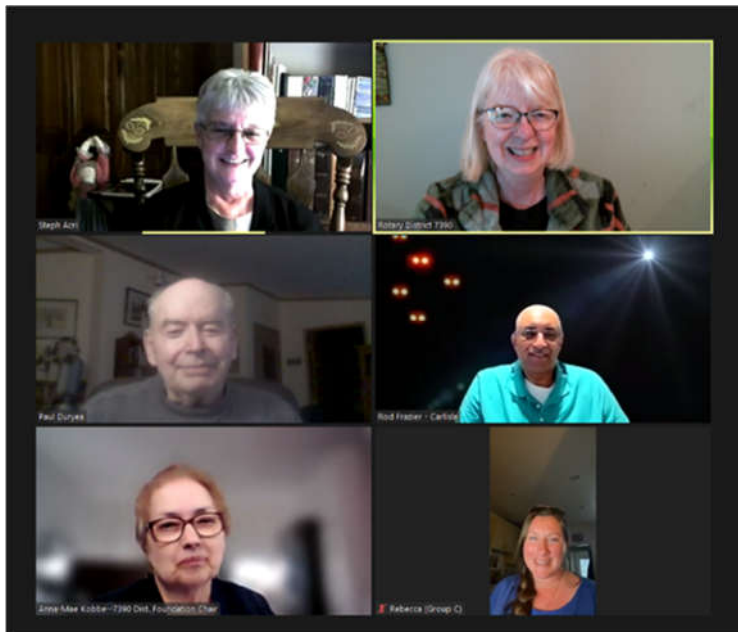

On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a global pandemic and in an instant our work lives, personal lives and Rotary lives changed forever. The word “pivot” was the new catch phrase for virtual meetings and new ways of engaging with one another. Store shelves were empty, hand sanitizer, if you could find it, was expensive, Lysol disinfecting wipes were nowhere to be found, and Rotarians used their sewing skills to make cloth masks that were distributed to friends and fellow Rotarians. Among the tremendous fear, worry, and stress that came with the pandemic, also came an outpouring of care and concern that Rotarians extended to their fellow club members and communities. One group of people that stepped up in an extraordinary way was the District 7390 Safety Committee. This committee was born from DG Juliet Altenburg who as a nurse worked with hospitals and her own place

of work to create COVID-19 safety protocols.

After three years of operations, the District Safety Committee had its last meeting in April 2023. The committee decided that based on the status of the pandemic and other district and club priorities it was a time to “sunset” the committee but keep themselves available on an as needed basis.
